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Message from Fr John

Winter 2018 has arrived and, unlike in other parts of the world, it is a mild climate this year in Australia.

One marvels at nature as we experience the season coming and going. We also marvel at the gifts of God as we experience the ever-changing patterns of human life around us — birth, infancy, childhood, adolescence, adulthood, married life, old age and rebirth into eternal life. I never cease giving thanks for this amazing circle of life.


Like the season, the circle of human life involves a regular pattern of renewal. What seems to be new for a short while soon becomes old — what seems to be old suddenly becomes new again. It's the great wonder of human life.

Our parish of St Patrick's Mortlake also changes over time. The Catholic population of our Parish is now 2,796 people. We Catholics represent 43% of the total population in this part of Sydney. We have the third highest percentage of Catholics among Sydney Catholic Parishes. The median age of our parishioners is 37 years of age. 21% of us are under 15 years of age and only 13% are over 65 years of age. There are 1,000 families in the Parish and 61% of women in the Parish are engaged in employment outside of the family home.

These are interesting statistics but they are constantly changing. There has been a huge increase in the number of children being baptised in our Parish in recent years. There were only 60 children baptised in 2008 and over 100 in the last 12 months. We are gradually becoming a younger Parish.

It seems that the old saying about "everything old becoming new again" applies to us. This amazing cycle of life means that, as a Parish, we need to recognise the signs of the times and be open to renewal. Hence, we now have a new Primary School.

We are moving into new modes of Social Communication and we will be renewing and improving our Pastoral Care,

St Patrick's Annual Parish Dinner

Saint Patrick's Mortlake Parish held its annual dinner on Friday evening, 25th May, 2018, at **Angelo's Cabarita**. It was a happy and enjoyable occasion for the 150 who were able to attend. It was also wonderful to welcome many of the staff and parents of the new school at St Patrick's Mortlake. The MC for the night was Paul Ballesty, who performed his role with great aplomb.

Our guests of honour were Monsignor John Usher, our Parish Priest and his very good friend from seminary days, Father John Langtry. Father Langtry is also celebrating his 80th birthday in June.

Monsignor John Usher in his address reminded us that we also had good cause to celebrate on 25th May as it was on this day in 1948 that Cardinal Gilroy proclaimed that St Patrick's was now a parish in its own right. So the Parish Dinner was the 70th anniversary of this important occasion.

Monsignor John also spoke of the many achievements of the parish and gave thanks to the parishioners who are working on the various ministries as well as new ones recently formed. Some of the statistics he quoted were: 165 children at Mortlake Public School are being instructed weekly by the volunteers under the leadership of

Bob Mayor; over the last year 130 baptisms were performed, 24 locals were married and sadly, we said goodbye to 16 parishioners who commenced Eternal Life.

One of the greatest achievements in the past year was the recent opening and blessing of the new school, St Patrick's Mortlake.

Monsignor John also gave thanks to Howard and Tony Brown, in their absence, for all their work on behalf of the parish. They will be sadly missed.

The entertainment of the night was provided by the very talented piano accordionist, Ross Maio. As well as taking requests, Ross capably and tactfully satisfied the diverse tastes of the Irish and Italian ancestry of many St Pat's parishioners. One of the star attractions of the night was the performance by the St Pat's teachers' choir, ably led by their principal, Mandy Westlake. Their rendition of *Quando Quando Quando* was a great success.

There were a number of interesting and valuable prizes won in the raffle, much to the delight of the winners. Many thanks to the donors for their generosity.

Are you interested in becoming an Acolyte or an Altar Server?

Acolytes assist the priest at Church by preparing the altar and sacred vessels prior to Mass and carrying the cross into the Church. During the Mass they assist the priest with the Offertory gifts of bread and wine, then assist with the distribution of the Eucharist.

It is open to both women and men. Acolytes must be over 16 years of age and altar servers must have received their first Holy Communion.

Training will be provided and a roster will be set up once numbers are finalised.
