St Patrick's Catholic Parish, Mortlake pays respect to elders past and present and extends this respect to all Aboriginal people living in or visiting the Parish.



On the weekend of 6-7 July, the Mortlake Conference of the St Vincent de Paul ran the Annual Vinnies Winter Appeal. Volunteers from the Conference spoke the weekend before and asked for financial contributions and donations of sox, gloves and beanies.

A large study of poverty found that there are over 3 million Australians living below the poverty line. St Patrick's Parish Mortlake responded generously, as they always have in the past. The \$3,120.65 donated will support those struggling with Winter, assisting with the increased power and food bills that come with this season.

Baskets at the back of the Church were filled to overflowing after each Mass with sox, gloves and beanies that will be gift wrapped and handed out by the Night Patrol and the Vinnies Brekkie vans. With over 20,000 homeless living in Sydney alone, and over 116,000 in Australia, there will be plenty of people who will be delighted with the gifts.

Thank you, St Patrick's, again for your wonderful kindness. St Vincent de Paul could not support the needv without your ongoing wonderful generosity.

The Census we had in Australia three years ago,

revealed that 116,000 people were counted as homeless. with 20,000 of those living in Sydney. Furthermore, in a large study of poverty in Australia last year, it found that there are a little over 3 million people living below the poverty line.
