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St. PAT's - 125 years. Did you know?

In 1931, as the Great Depression deepened, the Mortlake St Vincent de Paul Society, led by Harold and Rose Taylor, established a soup kitchen at the rear of Solomon's barber shop near the Mortlake wharf. The kitchen fed at least 50 poor and unemployed families each day.

Women of St Patrick's including Mrs Potter, Mrs Flynn and Mrs Moloney, the mother of the late Joe Moloney, operated the kitchen. This ecumenical initiative was strongly supported by William Solomon, an Anglican. He and his brothers had sent their children to the Sisters of Charity-operated St Patrick's School.

Harold Taylor was a respected builder and a great charity worker. His son, William Howard Taylor became a Vincentian priest (RIP 1989).

FR PETER MORRISSEY - RIP

It is with great sadness that I advise of the death of Fr. Peter Morrissey, who entered eternal life on Tuesday evening, 28 April. He was 91 years of age. Fr Peter was ordained on 30 July 1955 at St Mary's Cathedral by His Eminence, Cardinal Gilroy. He was a priest in over 10 parishes in the archdiocese in his remarkable life. He was appointed Parish Priest of St Patrick's Mortlake in 1997 where he remained until his retirement in 2003.

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FIRST READING

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles 2:14, 36-41

God has made Jesus both Lord and Christ.

On the day of Pentecost Peter stood up with the Eleven and addressed the crowd with a loud voice: 'The whole House of Israel can be certain that God has made this Jesus whom you crucified both Lord and Christ.'

Hearing this, they were cut to the heart and said to Peter and the apostles, 'What must we do, brothers?' 'You must repent,' Peter answered 'and every one of you must be baptised in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins, and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. The promise that was made is for you and your children, and for all those who are far away, for all those whom the Lord our God will call to himself.' He spoke to them for a long time using many arguments, and he urged them, 'Save yourselves from this perverse generation.' They were convinced by his arguments, and they accepted what he said and were baptised. That very day about three thousand were added to their number.

SECOND READING

A reading from the first letter of St Peter 1 Pt 2: 20-25

You had gone astray but now you have come back to the shepherd and guardian of your souls.

The merit, in the sight of God, is in bearing punishment patiently when you are punished after doing your duty.

This, in fact, is what you were called to do, because Christ suffered for you and left an example for you to follow the way he took. He had not done anything wrong, and there had been no perjury in his mouth. He was insulted and did not retaliate with insults; when he was tortured he made no threats but he put his trust in the righteous judge. He was bearing our faults in his own body on the cross, so that we might die to our faults and live for holiness; through his wounds you have been healed. You had gone astray like sheep but now you have come back to the shepherd and guardian of your souls.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John 10:1-10

I am the gate of the sheepfold.

Jesus said: 'I tell you most solemnly, anyone who does not enter the sheepfold through the gate, but gets in some other way is a thief and a brigand. The one who enters through the gate is the shepherd of the flock; the gatekeeper lets him in, the sheep hear his voice, one by one he calls his own sheep and leads them out. When he has brought out his flock, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow because they know his voice. They never follow a stranger but run away from him: they do not recognise the voice of strangers.'

Jesus told them this parable but they failed to understand what he meant by telling it to them.

So Jesus spoke to them again:

'I tell you most solemnly,

I am the gate of the sheepfold.

All others who have come

are thieves and brigands;

but the sheep took no notice of them.

I am the gate.

Anyone who enters through me will be safe:

he will go freely in and out

and be sure of finding pasture.

The thief comes

only to steal and kill and destroy.

I have come

so that they may have life

and have it to the full.'

WHAT IS COMMUNITY?

During these times we may question, 'What is our notion of Community?' When pillars of our traditional sense of community engagement have been momentarily sidelined, such as: extended family gatherings; weekly Church attendance or our ability to pop into the Church to say a prayer; club or school sporting activities; regular volunteering commitments; pub or restaurant visits - our sense of participation in our Community has changed.

We see in the readings, notably in the Acts of the Apostles, the strength of the early Christian community following the death of Christ. I commend us all to read the Acts of the Apostles during this time. Through it we indeed gain a tremendous insight into the strength of the early Christian community.

Whilst acknowledging pains and tensions which come through times such as these, we as Christians must always see signs of Hope. We are people of the Resurrection. This pandemic offers us a chance to effect positive and creative change – in myself, in my community, in my Church.

I may take this time of isolation as a period where I can look out for the "saints next door" in my community. Understanding that God never abandons his people, we need to see the saints at work in our community. The medical providers, those continuing to serve the most marginalised, those parents struggling yet doing their best with the tensions in the home environment with a young family; those caring for our older residents either at home or in nursing homes. These are the saints of our community. They don't wear a halo, rather they roll up their sleeves and make the best of a changing situation. These people keep our Community going.

Our ability to recognise these saints is perhaps how we can see this period as a period of positive and creative change. Fr. Tom
