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GOSPEL

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John – Jn 20:19-31.

After eight days Jesus came in and stood among them.

In the evening of that same day, the first day of the week, the doors were closed in the room where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews. Jesus came and stood among them. He said to them, 'Peace be with you,' and showed them his hands and his side. The disciples were filled with joy when they saw the Lord, and he said to them again, 'Peace be with you.

'As the Father sent me, so am I sending you.'

After saying this he breathed on them and said:

'Receive the Holy Spirit. For those whose sins you forgive, they are forgiven; for those whose sins you retain, they are retained.'

Thomas, called the Twin, who was one of the Twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. When the disciples said, 'We have seen the Lord', he answered, 'Unless I see the holes that the nails made in his hands and can put my finger into the holes they made, and unless I can put my hand into his side, I refuse to believe.' Eight days later the disciples were in the house again and Thomas was with them. The doors were closed, but Jesus came in and stood among them. 'Peace be with you' he said. Then he spoke to Thomas, 'Put your finger here; look, here are my hands. Give me your hand; put it into my side. Doubt no longer but believe.' Thomas replied, 'My Lord and my God!' Jesus said to him:

'You believe because you can see me. Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe.'

There were many other signs that Jesus worked and the disciples saw, but they are not recorded in this book. These are recorded so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing this you may have life through his name.

The Gospel of the Lord

"OKAY, HOUSTON, WE'VE HAD A PROBLEM HERE."

On April 13th, 1970, 50 years ago this Monday past, those famous words were uttered initially by Jack Swigert, then repeated by Jim Lovell as "Uh, Houston, we've had a problem." It was of course the early sign of distress for the near fateful Apollo 13 space mission in 1970, where following damage to oxygen tanks and wiring, the crew of the Apollo 13 and mission control personnel in Florida, were forced, in rushed and dire circumstances, to come up with novel and unique ways of ensuring the safe return of the space craft's three crew members to Earth. Various movies and documentaries have covered the event, and so it was, for the sake of a more 'dramatic theatre effect', for the 1995 film 'Apollo 13', the expression was shortened to simply "Houston, we have a problem."

So it is with us now — We Have A Problem. A problem which can and will be adapted to and overcome. We have teams of medical professionals looking at: cures; treatments; and preventative measures to deal with Covid-19. We all are radically adapting to the new reality. Because that is what needs to happen. And it needs to happen quickly. We give thanks for all service workers and personnel working tirelessly to keep us safe — the supermarket workers; the nurses; doctors; police and ambulance officers; etc. Physically we are adapting very quickly — and so far, we are told the "curve" seems to be "flattening".

Spiritually too though – We Have A Problem. Especially as Catholics, we have traditionally been bound to a priest led and Mass centred liturgical regime. Even now, when Mass cannot be celebrated in a physical gathering of community, we rely on live-stream Masses for us to witness. The Mass is rightly the centrepiece of our faith life as Catholics. But perhaps at this time – we can ask ourselves, in a life giving way – what other ways of worship, in addition to the Mass, may I encounter Christ? How can I as a Christian lay person, not formally trained to lead worship, nevertheless lead my immediate family community? After all, the Home is always the first Church.

The Church's tradition of course provides for this in: Lectio Divina and the meditative reading of the bible; the rosary; various devotions; simple family prayers; to pray through song and poetry; and also, to examine new ways to praise God. Going forward, this IS THE PROBLEM we must face. How can I, and we as a Church, look at prayer and engagement and true encounter with my God and humanity in a new way and quickly? Fr. Tom

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'LOCKDOWN STRESS' - ADULT & CHILDREN MENTAL HEALTH

Statistics released this week revealed that high percentages of our community are becoming increasingly stressed about the following significant issues we may be facing: 77% of us are becoming stressed over Not Seeing our Families; 60% of us are stressed over our ability to Pay our Bills; 49% of us are stressed over the possibly Losing Our Jobs.
