THIS WEEK AT ST PAT's - 125 YEARS AGO

This week we also (quietly) celebrated our church's 125th birthday. On 5 May 1895 Cardinal Moran officially blessed and opened St Patrick's Church-School. The church in those fledgling days was turned into a school during the week. The nearest buildings were the Fire Station and the Fireman's Cottage (purchased by the parish in 1929).

The original St Pat's Church Committee consisted of Timothy O'Connor McCarthy, Michael Moloney, Clement Glancy, Martin McNeeve, Roger O'Callaghan, J. Donoghue, M. Baggott, W. Woods, and J. Casey.

Our church opened debt free thanks to the late Dean Callaghan McCarthy's £300 bequest and wonderful fundraising and support by pioneer families, illustrated by the above members of the Church Committee.

125 YEARS...SIGNIFICANT MAY DATES

- 5 May 1895. Cardinal Patrick Moran blessed and opened St Patrick's Church, a chapel –of-ease attached to St Mary's Concord Parish.
- 11 May 1896. Cardinal Moran blessed and opened St Patrick's School, Mortlake.
- 16 May 1928. Mortlake Ferry (punt) commenced operation.
- 21 May 1929. Parish purchased Fire Station and Chief Fireman's Cottage (now the Hall/ Office and Green Space Sites).
- 23 May 1886. Official Opening of Mortlake Gasworks (now Breakfast Point) by the Australian Gas Light Company (AGL).

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FIRST READING

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles 6:1-7

They elected seven men filled with the Spirit and wisdom.

About this time, when the number of disciples was increasing, the Hellenists made a complaint against the Hebrews: in the daily distribution their own widows were being overlooked. So the Twelve called a full meeting of the disciples and addressed them, 'It would not be right for us to neglect the word of God so as to give out food; you, brothers, must select from among yourselves seven men of good reputation, filled with the Spirit and with wisdom; we will hand over this duty to them, and continue to devote ourselves to prayer and to the service of the word.' The whole assembly approved of this proposal and elected Stephen, a man full of faith and of the Holy Spirit, together with Philip, Prochorus, Nicanor, Timon, Parmenas, and Nicolaus of Antioch, a convert to Judaism. They presented these to the apostles, who prayed and laid their hands on them.

The word of the Lord continued to spread: the number of disciples in Jerusalem was greatly increased, and a large group of priests made their submission to the faith.

SECOND READING

A reading from the first letter of St Peter 1 Pt 2: 4-9

You are a chosen race, a royal priesthood.

The Lord is the living stone, rejected by men but chosen by God and precious to him; set yourselves close to him so that you too, the holy priesthood that offers the spiritual sacrifices which Jesus Christ has made acceptable to God, may be living stones making a spiritual house. As scripture says: See how I lay in Zion a precious cornerstone that I have chosen and the man who rests his trust on it will not be disappointed. That means that for you who are believers, it is precious; but for unbelievers, the stone rejected by the builders has proved to be the keystone, a stone to stumble over, a rock to bring men down. They stumble over it because they do not believe in the word; it was the fate in store for them.

But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a consecrated nation, a people set apart to sing the praises of God who called you out of the darkness into his wonderful light.

Philip said, 'Lord, let us see the Father and then we shall be satisfied.' 'Have I been with you all this time, Philip,' said Jesus to him 'and you still do not know me?

'To have seen me is to have seen the Father, so how can you say, "Let us see the Father"? Do you not believe

that I am in the Father and the Father is in me? The words I say to you I do not speak as from myself:

it is the Father, living in me, who is doing this work. You must believe me when I say that I am in the Father and the Father is in me; believe it on the evidence of this work, if for no other reason.

'I tell you most solemnly, whoever believes in me will perform the same works as I do myself, he will perform even greater works, because I am going to the Father.'

MOTHER'S DAY – SEEING GOD IN MY WORLD THROUGH THE "FEMININE GENIUS"

We as a society or Church need to be open to evolving and changing when we gain a greater understanding of the complexities and beauty of our human existence. We can see developments and changes in our own Church. Over the last 50 years in particular, it may be said that a greater understanding and appreciation of the "Feminine Genius" and spirituality, as Pope John Paul II coined the term, has taken place.

The Catholic Church has a tradition of appointing 'Doctors' of the Church. The practice started in the Middle Ages, and originally applied to the early great leaders, such as: St. Ambrose; St. Augustine; St. Gregory and St. Jerome. Doctors of the Church are individuals, who through their study and writing, have brought the Church body into a greater understanding of our faith. Currently, there are only 36 Doctors of the Church in its entire history – these are people we should seek to emulate, as in their lives they journeyed to gain a greater understanding of Christ. 4 of the 36 Doctors are female.

Interestingly, in terms of the Church's growth and development, all four female Doctors of the Church have been appointed since 1970. That is, prior to 1970, all Doctors were male. The appointed female Doctors are: St. Teresa of Avila; St. Catherine of Siena; St. Therese of Lisieux; and St. Hildegard of Bingen. It mightn't sound significant on an initial reading, but it points to a salient issue – that is, of the Church's increasing awareness of the "Feminine Genius" in our understanding of Christ.

I pray that as a Church, our understanding and appreciation of God through feminine thought, just as through masculine/indigenous or refugee knowledge of God in our world, continues.

Recently, my attention was drawn to the below linked VERILY magazine. It is a magazine targeted at young women, emphasising female dignity and leadership potential in our world. One of the magazine's selling points is that they do not use Photoshop on any female images, embracing our reality that can sometimes be obscured in an image centred culture. The magazine's founders are women from a Catholic tradition and I think reflect those principles in their articles. I commend the magazine and articles to us all, but especially to women, in an effort to embrace and grow in an inclusive feminine understanding of Christ in my, and the Church's, life. https://verilymag.com/2020/04/letting-go-of-news-stress-anxiety-connection-relationships
