In the Gospel of Matthew, Jesus tells a teaching story, a parable, to Peter when he asked Jesus how many times we must forgive others. Jesus said 70 times 7, in other words ***forgiveness is limitless.***

A reading from the book of Ecclesiasticus
Sir 27:30 – 28:7

**Forgive your neighbour's faults and when you pray,
your sins will be forgiven.**

GOSPEL

A reading from the holy Gospel according to
Matthew
Mt 18:21-35

**I tell you that you forgive not seven times but
seventy times seven.**

Peter went up to Jesus and said, 'Lord, how often
must I forgive my brother if he wrongs me? As often
as seven times?' Jesus answered, 'Not seven, I tell
you, but seventy-seven times.

'And so the kingdom of heaven may be compared to
a king who decided to settle his accounts with his
servants. When the reckoning began, they brought
him a man who owed ten thousand talents; but he
had no means of paying, so his master gave orders
that he should be sold, together with his wife and
children and all his possessions, to meet the debt. At
this, the servant threw himself down at his master's
feet. "Give me time," he said "and I will pay the
whole sum." And the servant's master felt so sorry
for him that he let him go and cancelled the debt.

GOSPEL (continued)

Now as this servant went out, he happened to meet a fellow servant who owed him one hundred denarii; and he seized him by the throat and began to throttle him. "Pay what you owe me", he said. His fellow servant fell at his feet and implored him, saying, "Give me time and I will pay you." But the other would not agree; on the contrary, he had him thrown into prison till he should pay the debt. His fellow servants were deeply distressed when they saw what had happened, and they went to their master and reported the whole affair to him. Then the master sent for him. "You wicked servant," he said. "I cancelled all that debt of yours when you appealed to me. Were you not bound, then, to have pity on your fellow servant just as I had pity on you?" And in his anger the master handed him over to the torturers till he should pay all his debt. And that is how my heavenly Father will deal with you unless you each forgive your brother from your heart.'

PARISH FINANCES

Our Parish financial year result for 2019/20 was an unaudited surplus of \$31,446, down from \$78,153 in 2018/19. Our equity at 30th June 2020 was \$155,551 (\$132,159 in 2018/19).

The full results will be posted on the Notice Board once audited.

Income was, of course, down but the result was enhanced by significant contribution from Parishioners, a bequest and Government grants via Covid Cash Flow (\$10,000) and JobKeeper (\$6,000).

Establishing a budget for 2020/21 has its difficulties and the Finance Committee has budgeted this year for a deficit of \$22,200. The budget provides for lesser income and for additional costs for the salary of our recently engaged Book keeper, a higher level of cleaning due to Covid and costs associated with Fr Toms appointment (much of Mons John costs were met elsewhere).

A special THANK YOU to the many Parishioners for your ongoing support to our Parish finances while impacted by the Covid pandemic.
