

2020 marks 125 years since the beginning of St Patrick's Parish Mortlake. Since our earliest days, we have been blessed and enriched by priests, religious sisters and families who have made their home in Mortlake, and have made St Patrick's their parish. The faith, energy and commitment of the early Irish settlers has flourished, and successive generations of people from many different cultures and nationalities have contributed to the wonderfully diverse and vibrant parish community we share today.

Pope's Encyclical on Fraternity & Social Friendship

Pope Francis' new encyclical *Fratelli Tutti: On Fraternity and Social Friendship*, issues a strong challenge to xenophobia and an exaggerated focus on national self-interest. It encourages social and economic inclusion at all levels and stresses that all human beings are sisters and brothers, members of one human family. This is a timely message for us all.

Vatican News reported that "The Encyclical Letter Fratelli tutti is about love and attention – the kind of attention that brings a broken and bleeding world back to health. It is a social meditation on the Good Samaritan, who recognises love and attention as the preeminent law, and models for us creative social friendship." "Pope Francis asks us to gaze at the world similarly, such that we come to see the basic, indispensable relation of all things and people, near and far. In its simplicity of call, Fratelli tutti is a devastating challenge to our ecological, political, economic, and social life. But above all it is a proclamation of an ineradicable, joyful truth, presented here as a well-spring for a fatigued world."

A 'SNEAK PEAK' inside the PARISH HISTORY BOOK – 'AN ENDURING FLAME'

In the first of a series of articles in the lead-up to next month's exciting release of the parish's official history, our historian, Damian Gleeson provides a brief overview of the earliest events in St Patrick's history between 1885 and 1895.

2020 is the 125th anniversary of St Patrick's Church, which when constructed in 1895 was originally less than half the current size. It was also the only Catholic Church built in Sydney during the 1890s economic depression that was debt free thanks to a bequest from Dean Callaghan McCarthy of the Burwood (now Concord) Parish and the generosity of so many early Irish working-class members, especially the Callaghan, McNeeve, McCarthy, Moloney, and Toohey families.

Given 1895 is such a key date in our parish's history, why does the sub-title of our parish history, An Enduring Flame, refer to 1885? The inclusion of 1885 is intentional as a means of giving due recognition to the earliest development of a Catholic community at Mortlake. From 1885 poor Irish immigrants and their families began to settle at Mortlake, often in small shanty cottages in what was then called New Burwood Road (now Gale Street), or in Lake Street (which would be taken over by the Australian Gas Light Company), or in Edwin and Mortlake Streets, for example.

Given the scarcity of housing at Mortlake, quite a few Irish labourers lived at Burwood, including at several public houses, and thus their 'abode' is listed as Burwood when their children were baptised at St Mary's Concord. The first identifiable Mortlake family in terms of a baptism were the McFadden's, on 28 December 1886 Julia Catherine, the eldest child of James McFadden and Julia King was born at Mortlake.

'AN ENDURING FLAME' (continued)

Dean McCarthy baptised Julia at Concord on 16
January 1887. From the mid-1880s Dean
McCarthy had identified the needs of this
emerging Catholic population of Mortlake and
the accompanying small villages of Riverview and
Beaconsfield. He appreciated the transport
distance and difficulties for those people living at
the northern and eastern ends of the peninsular
who wished to attend Mass at Concord.

1889 was a critical year in the lead-up to a Catholic Church at Mortlake. Through the dean's instigation, the Archdiocese of Sydney purchased land at Mortlake on 17 July 1889. The same year marked the first Mortlake district marriage: James Rourke, a native of County Kildare, Ireland, aged 27 and a labourer at the Gas Works, married Annie Giles, 18, a domestic servant on 21 September.
