'One of the highlights of my time spent in Rome was the anticipation of seeing various Nativity scenes unveiled around the city. It was a subtle public display of faith. I was especially fond of the personalised local touches the Nativity scenes included. I recall one Nativity scene having crabs, a Mediterranean seal and the famous swarming starlings of Rome.

I think we need to include a platypus, wombat and kangaroo in our own nativity scene. Or perhaps Nativity scene characters that symbolise: a refugee; a widow(er); a lonely husband or wife; an addict; a cancer patient; a corrupt official, etc. The Christmas message is that God is in the midst of all our anxiety and messiness.

The theme for NAIDOC WEEK 2020, <u>'Always Was, Always Will Be'</u>, recognises that First Nations People have occupied and cared for this continent for over 65,000 years.

The Australian Jesuit Province's Bookends Project focuses on the two 'bookends of rejection' in Australian history: our treatment of First Nations peoples and our treatment of refugees and asylum seekers. The project is working to give the Australian Jesuit community a defined and meaningful space to reflect on the relationships we all hold, as humans, with First Nations communities and with refugees and people seeking asylum. And to determine a path forward through truth telling, to assist those communities in an environment of hospitality.

Pastoral Care Visitations. Can you help?


