
The Reality of Presence and Absence

Last week I visited my late father's house on the south coast. I hadn't visited the family home since his death. There was some personal trepidation of going back without my father being physically there for the first time. What would it feel like? Would it all be too sad?

The house certainly lacked a soul, a warmth which had previously permeated its walls. The cups of tea weren't as meaningful. A physical PRESENCE was missing. Yet upon reflection I saw that in the lack of presence how blessed and fortunate one had been to have such people in one's life. There's a tremendous joy in seeing a life well lived, a life that shapes us into who we are (for better or worse!). This is the true gift of Jesus in our lives, to have such people present showing us love.

I need to see this gift of Presence in: marriage; family; charity; workplace; home; my addiction; my illness; my joy. God must be Present in the midst of all these things.

We are now in the final period of Lent and approach Easter. During this time, we as Christians have been asking the biggest questions humanity ponders – What will make me truly happy? Where and how do I ensure my life is lived as a life-giving presence to those around me? The Easter message is about realising the PRESENCE AND ABSENCE in our lives. Lent is about acknowledging the Absence, and of my need for something more. But Easter promises Presence. A Presence and Hope which never leaves us, "And remember, I am with you always, to the end of time." (Mt 28:20)

aces of St Pats: Marie Piccin

Most of you would be familiar with Marie Piccin who is very involved in both our parish and community in many ways. Her generous and time-consuming contributions, especially in Stewardship, the Social Ministry, and the Communications Ministry have been invaluable to the parish.

This is Marie's story

I have lived in Concord all my life, went to St. Mary's Concord as a Primary School student and later Rosebank and Santa Sabina at Strathfield.

I became a primary teacher in the late 70s and my first job as a Year One teacher at St. Mary's Concord, was in the same classroom where I had been taught as a Year 2 student. I had been teaching for about seven years when the family opened Angelo's Bayside Restaurant in Cabarita. The business went from strength to strength and I made the decision to leave teaching and work in the family business. Although I had very little experience in hospitality, it was a decision I never regretted and I worked at Angelo's for just over thirty one years, retiring four years ago.

During the years I was at Angelo's I met people from so many different walks of life, along with their families and friends. We organised their weddings, wakes, christenings, Holy Communions, Confirmations, birthdays, anniversaries, retirement dinners and even the odd divorce party. It was always a privilege to be involved in the most important moments of their lives and to this day I have the fondest of memories. We had the most dedicated and loyal staff for over 31 years and many have remained our dearest friends to this day.

When I finally had more time on my hands, Mons John said that he had a little job for me to do and suddenly I was a volunteer at St. Pat's. The past four years have flown but it's been a joy to meet and work with so many dedicated and enthusiastic Parishioners. As PSSO, (Parish Safeguarding Support Officer) and with Parish Secretary, Brenda Johnston's help and guidance I have been able to support our volunteers and ensure that we are compliant and up-to-date with the latest legislation.



Also as a member of the Communications team and the Social Ministry committee I have been able to offer my support where needed and I have made many new friends gaining valuable skills along the way.

2020-2021 has been a difficult time for all of us and St. Patrick's has continued to be that beacon of light for so many in our community. As coordinator of the Stewardship ministry I have been overwhelmed by the generous support of so many offering to take on Covid Marshall duties, help with volunteering and generally offering their assistance where needed.

St Patrick's is truly a remarkable Parish and Fr. Tom continues to walk with us along the journey that began 125 years ago. A journey that has benefitted from the stewardship of so many dedicated clergy, enthusiastic parishioners and the wider community. I feel very blessed to have been asked to 'do a little job' and look forward to doing so for as long as I'm able.

"But you," he said "who do you say I am?" Then Simon Peter spoke up, "You are the Christ," he said, "the Son of the Living God". (Matthew 16: 15-16)
