#### **HAPPY EASTER 2021 – EMBRACE THE HOPE**

Well what a difference a year makes! It is marvellous to be able to gather as a community again this Easter and take time out to reflect on the importance of Hope and Faith in our lives this Easter 2021.

Holy Week is all about the encounter of the human condition with the myriad of emotions and anxieties we all face daily. This Week we encounter the anxieties of: the disciples; the women; Pilate; the guards and the anxieties of Jesus himself.

If Jesus was given a 'job description', one of the key tasks in his role would be 'to relieve anxiety and tension for stressful human beings'. ## GOSPEL – VIGIL MASS SATURDAY NIGHT

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark Mk 16:1-7

Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified, has risen.

When the sabbath was over, Mary of Magdala, Mary the mother of James, and Salome, bought spices with which to go and anoint him. And very early in the morning on the first day of the week they went to the tomb, just as the sun was rising.

They had been saying to one another, 'Who will roll away the stone for us from the entrance to the tomb?' But when they looked they could see that the stone – which was very big – had already been rolled back. On entering the tomb they saw a young man in a white robe seated on the right hand side, and they were struck with amazement. But he said to them, 'There is no need for alarm. You are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified: he has risen, he is not here. See, here is the place where they laid him. But you must go and tell his disciples and Peter, "He is going before you to Galilee; it is there you will see him, just as he told you."'

## FIRST READING – EASTER SUNDAY

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles Acts 10:34. 37-43

We have eaten and drunk with him after his resurrection from the dead.

Peter addressed Cornelius and his household: 'You must have heard about the recent happenings in Judaea; about Jesus of Nazareth and how he began in Galilee, after John had been preaching baptism. God had anointed him with the Holy Spirit and with power, and because God was with him,

Jesus went about doing good and curing all who had fallen into the power,

of the devil. Now I, and those with me, can witness to everything he did throughout the countryside of Judaea and in Jerusalem itself: and also to the fact that they killed him by hanging him on a tree, yet three days afterwards God raised him to life and allowed him to be seen, not by the whole people but only by certain witnesses God had chosen beforehand. Now we are those witnesses – we have eaten and drunk with him after his resurrection from the dead – and he has ordered us to proclaim this to his people and to tell them that God has appointed him to judge everyone, alive or dead. It is to him that all the prophets bear this witness: that all who believe in Jesus will have their sins forgiven through his name.'

#### **GOSPEL**

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John Jn 20:1-9

The teaching of scripture is that he must rise from the dead.

It was very early on the first day of the week and still dark, when Mary of Magdala came to the tomb. She saw that the stone had been moved away from the tomb and came running to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one Jesus loved. 'They have taken the Lord out of the tomb' she said 'and we don't know where they have put him.'

## **GOSPEL - continued**

So Peter set out with the other disciple to go to the tomb. They ran together, but the other disciple, running faster than Peter, reached the tomb first; he bent down and saw the linen cloths lying on the ground, but did not go in. Simon Peter who was following now came up, went right into the tomb, saw the linen cloths on the ground, and also the cloth that had been over his head; this was not with the linen cloths but rolled up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple who had reached the tomb first also went in; he saw and he believed. Till this moment they had failed to understand the teaching of scripture that he must rise from the dead.

Over the years our Parish has sought donations to undertake the renovation to our Church and the construction of the presbytery. We are proposing similar opportunities for the ongoing maintenance of the Green Space and for support, for the upgrading of the Hall to create a more user friendly and multi-use community space. Donations have been received for the Granite Feature Table, 10 of the 13 Timber Pillars and 7 of the 14 Sandstone Logs.
