



# aces of St Pats — Denise and Len Norman

Denise and Len would be very familiar faces to many parishioners at St Pat's, young and old. Parishioners of St Pat's for over 22 years, they have been very active assisting in various ministries. They have had the privilege of having Fr Peter Morrissey, Msgr John Usher and Fr Tom Stevens as Parish Priests in this time. For them, the feeling of community at St Pat's is very strong, and it is akin to being considered an extended family.



Before retiring, both Denise and Len have had interesting careers, Len working for IBM and Denise's last job was to set up the Australasian Reservation Centre for Holiday Inn in Sydney and then the Asia Pacific Reservation Centre in Singapore. Their family life is now very busy, with nine great grandchildren including twins and another on the way.

Denise has been a member of the Social Ministry, a catechist, as well as being involved in the RCIA and sacramental programs of the Parish. Len has also assisted in many ways, especially helping with the collections and reading at Mass.

Denise first became involved in the Parish by driving various parishioners to Mass on Sundays. Next was Bingo and assisting Anne Manenti with this wonderful community initiative and she is now "fluent" in Italian from zero to nine. In her other role in Faith Education, Denise says that assisting Bob Mayor with the training of the children for the sacraments and more recently assisting him in instructing adults who want to join the Catholic faith has been so rewarding. She would encourage others to think about becoming involved in this Ministry too.

### Len and the Bus

Last year, Len was interviewed on the ABC News when it was announced that the City of Parramatta was acknowledging his great grandmother, Rosie Bint Broheen, by displaying her name, one of just two, on the side of a gleaming eight-metre-tall aluminium replica of a vintage bus. The choice to add Rosie's name to the artwork celebrates the importance of her contribution to the transcultural exchange story of the City of Parramatta.

Len's great-grandmother, Rosie Bint Broheen, migrated to Sydney in the late 1890s, after a three-month voyage, from her village of Kfarsghab in Lebanon, leaving her husband and children in the care of the village in a country experiencing political turmoil.

The aim was to establish a better life enabling the family to follow her. When she reached Australia, a custom's officer 'changed' her name, Rosie Bint Broheen, which means "daughter of the Abraham family" into Rosie O'Brien. She was granted a hawker's licence and eventually became one of the first Lebanese women to purchase property in Parramatta in 1922.

Len's story celebrates another rich strand of Australia's multicultural history and now we at St Pat's are further enriched by that connection.

When asked about the future of St Pat's, Denise and Len replied:

'Whilst COVID certainly hit us hard like the rest of the community, we feel the patronage of St Pat's is gaining strength even as we speak. We have been surprised on several occasions to discover attendance by many of our friends at our new 10:30 am Mass. They report the convenience of the timing and the feeling of welcome that has impressed them.

The future of our parish is safe in the hands of the young families involved in our new school. Encouragement from both the parish and the school is working towards a strong community. We are delighted to be part of the St Pat's community and strongly recognise the feeling of belonging.'

We at St Pat's thank you, Len and Denise, for your contribution to our Parish which has been very generous and unstinting over these many years.

### audate Si St Pat's

The Archdiocese of Sydney has made a toolkit available for parish groups who wish to get active around Care of Creation.

Launching the kit at St Patrick's Mortlake on Sunday, May 21, Justice and Peace Promoter Fr Peter Smith said the kit helps us reflect on how we can be a part of Pope Francis's call for us to walk gently on this planet.

"The kit offers practical ways that we as individuals, as families, as parishes, as schools, can engage with Pope Francis's encyclical, the ways we can, in a sense, be co-creators with God of this planet."

The launch event was attended by parishioners from around the Archdiocese. Attendees each received a flowering plant to take back and plant in their home or parish, each including a QR code linking to the kit, which is digital-only to provide an example of using fewer resources.

Social Justice Facilitator Dr Michael Walker said, "As these plants are taken back and take root in our home communities, hopefully the ideas set out in our new kit will also take root around the Archdiocese".

"The Church has given environmental concern a new focus with the Laudato Si' Action Platform. It stands in a long tradition, though, that can be found in the writings of the Saints and in the Hebrew Scriptures."

St Patrick's parishioner Maureen Casey said, "I support Pope Francis' encyclical, Laudate Si, and yesterday's celebration of Mass at St Patrick's Mortlake enhanced the importance of each parish working actively to support the care of all creation.

"It was a significant ceremony which marked the



the introduction of 'the Care of Creation' guide for Parish Groups. The symbol of the distribution of the seedlings was a practical demonstration of how we could begin.

"It was a special privilege to have been part of this occasion. I hope our parishes are successful in continuing this good work."


