# Fearful yet overjoyed, they ran to tell the Disciples

The approaching Easter Season is one of great anticipation and excitement. It's important to remember that it's also greeted with much nervousness and bewilderment. Yet it is the greatest love story ever told, and it embraces humanity completely.


We have the women having the courage to approach the tomb, frightened at first, but that fear turns to joy. Matthew's Gospel describes the women — "they went away quickly from the tomb, fearful yet overjoyed, and ran to announce to his disciples" Mt 28:8. The women's first reaction is to share the joy "quickly". In the Easter story we have a whole series of individuals who display our own humanity — betrayal, denial, distrust, disappointment, as well as joy, hope, celebration and faith.

Easter is the message of great Joy. Even in the midst of fear and distrust, which is real in so many regions in our world, (including the Holy Land itself, the birthplace of Christ), and can also be in our relationships, there remains Joy which must be shared. Each of us needs to roll away the stone of the tomb which holds us back, to have courage in facing our realities, our triumphs and complications alike. To embrace the Joy, and to embrace it quickly!

#### **Faith Education Ministry**

At St Pat's we are fortunate to have a very proactive and vital Faith Education Ministry. This is what is involved:

**Catechists** — Weekly lessons are provided to the Catholic school children attending classes Kindy to Year 6 at Mortlake Primary School each Friday morning during school term. We are currently blessed to have a great team of Catechists and Assistants fulfilling this ministry.

**First Sacraments** — Children receiving the Sacraments of Reconciliation, First Holy Communion and Confirmation at St Patrick's are registered and instructed by our team. The numbers have increased significantly, with the children from St Patrick's Primary School raising the overall number of children receiving these First Sacraments to over 100 each year.

**Adult Education** — We present, from time-to-time, sessions on interesting aspects of the Catholic Faith in our Parish Hall. in late 2023 a series of sessions on the Old Testament titled '*The Roots and History of our Salvation Story*' was presented by Hana Smit over 5 sessions. The sessions were very well researched and were really worthwhile. We are looking forward to expanding our education offerings to the parish.

**Children's Liturgy** — This is provided for our children at the 9am Mass each Sunday. We have a great team of instructors and the children love the sessions and sharing with the congregation what they have learned as they return to the church after the homily. **Baptismal Preparation** — This Is conducted by two of our parishioners who assist families to prepare for this major Sacrament. After a Baptism is booked, instruction is given to the families on the Sacrament and what is expected of the parents on the day and into the future.

**RCIA** — This ministry involves the instruction of individuals who wish to join our faith and become a Catholic. The initials stand for "The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults" and our team provides the instruction and leadership in the process of assisting them to become a Catholic.

As can be seen, there are many aspects in our Faith Education Ministry and we are always looking to welcome any parishioners who have an interest in one or more of the categories of the ministry. #### Parishioner Gil Vella's Award

Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice ("For Church and Pope" in Latin) is a decoration of the Holy See. It is currently conferred for distinguished service to the Catholic Church by lay people and clergy.

**Congratulations to St Pat's parishioner, Gil Vella.** Gil was recently awarded the Papal Honour from Pope Francis - the decoration **Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice** ("For Church and Pope"). Archbishop Fisher bestowed the award on behalf of Pope Francis for Gil's exceptional contribution to the life of the church as a faithful Catholic layman, husband, and father, particularly through his extensive



work in his parishes and his association with the St Vincent de Paul Society. Dr Gilbert Vella, former head of the School of B i o m e d i c a l

Science at the University of Sydney, never saw a conflict between his passion for scientific research and his faith.

"Even from my uni days you'd have these discussions that science is all you need but to me science opens up what God has done," he said. "You can see the beauty of nature and how it all fits together. Every time I find some new thing, I'm just amazed and constantly surprised by the grandeur of it all.

"I see the imprint of something much bigger and can't see how people cannot believe in a God, myself."

Gil said he was humbled and grateful to receive the award of Croce pro Ecclesia et Pontifice (Cross for the Church and the Pope) from Archbishop Anthony Fisher OP on behalf of the Holy Father.

'It's my honour to have contributed to the parish life of the Strathfield and Mortlake communities and to the St Vincent de Paul Society," Dr Vella told the assembly at the award presentation. "I was blessed to have wonderful parents in Charles and Lucia who taught me by their example the value of participating in and serving our parish community.



"And in my 40 years in Strathfield and nine years in Mortlake I was fortunate to have parish priests who encouraged me and valued lay leadership of various activities.

I found all my involvement in parish initiatives greatly rewarding — not only did it encourage me to contribute to the community in a meaningful way, it also enriched my spiritual life."

Gil also acknowledged his wife, Margaret and his family for being there for him.

#### Faces of St Pat's — Trevor Parmenter







Trevor Parmenter, parishioner and acolyte at St Pat's has recently been conferred the award of an Honorary Doctorate of Letters (honoris causa) by the University of New England (UNE). He has achieved this prestigious award considering his outstanding national and international pioneering work and contribution to the field of intellectual disability.

Professor Trevor Parmenter has dedicated his life to the support of people with intellectual disability and has been recognised for his pioneering work in this field for over 70 years with at least 20 different significant awards and commendations, including an Order of Australia.

He is currently Professor Emeritus at the University of Sydney Medical School and has been an adjunct Professor at the School of Rural Medicine at UNE since 2011.

Trevor has maintained a long-standing and ongoing relationship with both Armidale and UNE following the initial completion of his first qualification — a 2-year teacher training course — at Armidale Teachers' College in 1952. Trevor worked for twenty-one years in schools across both rural and metropolitan locations in NSW. In 1974 he joined the foundation staff at Macquarie University's Special Education Centre, and, following this career change, he completed his PhD in special education.

Trevor, who turns 90 this year, very generously gave us some of his personal story. He and his wife Marie moved from Castle Hill where he had lived since 1964 to Breakfast Point in 2016. Sadly, Trevor's first wife of 29 years died in 1984. On arrival as a new parishioner at St Pat's he, fortuitously, found Mons John Usher, who had been a friend of many years, was now

St Pat's Parish Priest. John urged him to join the acolyte team and also to join the fledging Social Justice Ministry.

Trevor retired from the University of Sydney Medical School and Director of the Centre for Disability Studies at the end of 2009. As Professor Emeritus he still continues some teaching, supervision of doctoral students, active research and involvement in disability advocacy activities nationally and internationally.

Trevor has summed up the highlights of his long and impressive career: "It was my one-teacher school experience (plus having attended one in my primary years) which convinced me about the importance of community, the theme of my Occasional Address at the graduation ceremony.

I rate my 7 years at Sunny Corner as the most rewarding in my whole career. In those years I helped to reinvigorate the small community which was the remnant of a once bustling silver mine of the 1880s to the 1920s. Those seven years took up considerable space in my Life Story." Trevor also wrote a history of Sunny Corner, in the Bathurst region, for its centenary in 1961.

Well done, Trevor. We at St Pat's are proud of you.

Congratulations also to Paula Patterson and her family. Paula's family, the Alice Family (originally from Italy) recently celebrated 100 years in Australia. Paula, and her husband, Bill (deceased), also have been in the St Pat's Parish for more than 50 years.

### A Century's Remarkable Achievement

On Saturday 6th January 2024, the Alice, Patterson and del Zotto families celebrated the 100th anniversary of the arrival of the family in Australia. Over 75 descendants and their partners, descendants of Giovanni and Santina Alice gathered at the St Pat's Parish Hall to commemorate the milestone.

In November 1923, Giovanni and Santina, recently married and in their early 20s, left Serravalle Scrivia in Piedmont, Italy, to begin a new life in Australia. They had been enticed by Giovanni's brother, Domenico, who had come out some ten years prior. Domenico often wrote letters home always talking up the idyllic life and boundless opportunity to be had in Australia.

Originally a cobbler, Giovanni joined his brother who ran the first continental delicatessen in Ramsay Road, Haberfield. Later in the 1950s, he would open a deli with his son, also named Dom, on Concord Road, North Strathfield.

No doubt life was challenging in those early years

having to negotiate a new language, culture, and climate. Two things sustained them: faith and family. Many who gathered didn't have the opportunity to meet Giovanni and Santina, Nonno and Nonna, with their passing in 1967 and 1989, respectively. However, with stories told and photos shared, all could appreciate their goodness and fidelity to faith and family.

The St Pat's Parish Hall was such a perfect venue. It was well equipped and large enough to accommodate the small crowd, but it also afforded an intimate space for the gathering. And, as nice as it was to gather, the Mass that was offered for Giovanni and Santina that night was the most meaningful celebration.

Giovanni and Santina's son, Dom, aged 97, is father to Maria Alice, a long-time parishioner at St Pat's, and their daughter, Paula Patterson, has been a parishioner since 1966. We're happy to share our celebration in these pages with our St Pat's family.
